## BOOK ALLEGES MISTREATMENT OF TED WILLIAMS' BODY

PHOENIX (AP) — A new book by a former employee of Alcor, the company that froze Ted Williams' remains, alleges the baseball Hall of Famer's body was mistreated by the company.

Larry Johnson says in the book "Frozen: My Journey Into the World of Cryonics, Deception and Death" that he watched an Alcor official swing a monkey wrench at Williams' frozen severed head to try to remove a screw that was stuck to it. The first swing accidentally struck the head, Johnson contends, and the second knocked the tuna can loose.

Alcor Life Extension Foundation of Scottsdale, Ariz., issued a statement on its Web site denying the allegations and promising legal action.

## Tigers use bye week to heal, win

A week off was just what the Tigers needed.

Refreshed and healthy for the first time in weeks, Telesis traveled to Quartzsite Thursday and defeated Scholars Academy 34-14.

"We started off strong and just kept it going," said Tigers head coach Landon Merrill.

Tigers' Geoff Garrett scored twice, once from about 45-yards out the other 70-yards. Ernie Celon also had a rushing TD, from just beyond the Scholars 40-yard-line. And quarterback Cody Kramer also put one in on the ground, a 3-yard keeper on the tight wedge.

Kramer also had a passing TD, a dump pass to tight end Nathaniel Merrill that Merrill was able to turn into a 50-yard scoring play.

But it was the defense that carried the day, preventing the Scholars from seeing the Tigers' side of the field.

"They had a couple of trick plays that caught us, that's where they got their touchdowns. But other than that, we kept them on their side of the field," Landon Merrill said.

The Tigers forced three fumbles and scored seven sacks on the night.

game against Apache Junction Apache Trail. Coaches for the Wolfpack were in Quartzsite filming the game and scouting the Tigers.

"We know that they're a pass-

ing team, small and fast. They like to go four wide, anything that can move the ball quick downfield," Merrill said. "This will be good for us because we usually see teams that are bigger than us, not as fast

as us."

## Wolves take a big bite out of Broncos

PARKER — A week after their win in Sedona, the Parker Broncos again found themselves on the receiving end of a lopsided score as they lost to the Estrella Foothills Wolves, 56-6, Friday night at home.

The first half belonged almost exclusively to the Wolves. Running back Anthony Alfonso, wide receiver Avery Boykin and tight end Troy Coleman each had two touchdowns and running back Josh Trejo added another as the Wolves had a 49-0 lead at half-time.

The Wolves got their scores on long runs, short runs and passes. Coleman got his second touchdown on an interception with 4.8 seconds left in the half.

In the first half, the Broncos couldn't seem to get anything

going. Some of their biggest gains were on Wolf penalties. They often found themselves having to use their punter, Mitch Newman.

The Broncos seemed to come alive in the second half, holding the Wolves to one touchdown early in the third quarter.

Parker finally got into scoring position when Andrew Hernandez hit David Stewart with a pass and Stewart shook off several tacklers to run it down to the Wolves' five-yard line. However, the Wolves held off the Broncos, and it looked like the drive was going to fail.

Then, on fourth-and-14, pass interference was called on the Wolves and the Broncos got an automatic first down and another chance. On the third down, Hernandez plowed across the goal line for Parker's only score of the game.

The Broncos are now 2-4 overall and 1-1 against their 3A West rivals. Next Friday, they travel to Phoenix to take on the South Pointe Griffins. Their next home game will be Oct. 16 against the Chino Valley Cougars.

This is also the Homecoming game. Game time is 7 p.m.

## Yuma's Baker runs all over Havasu, again

Yuma's J.C. Baker scored three times, setting a new school record for career touchdowns, as the Criminals defeated the Lake Havasu High School Fighting Knights for the second time this season.

Yuma (3-3, 1-0) won 48-31. Havasu (3-3, 0-1) got as close as three points late in the game, scoring on two successive drives. At the start of the fourth period, Knights quarterback Doug Greene ran it in from eight-yards out then hit Dylan Olson for the two-point conversion to bring the deficit to 10, 34-24.

On the next series the Havasu defense held, sacking Yuma quarterback Donte Jackson on a third down to force a punt that took a big Havasu bounce, all the way to the Knights' 48-yard-line.

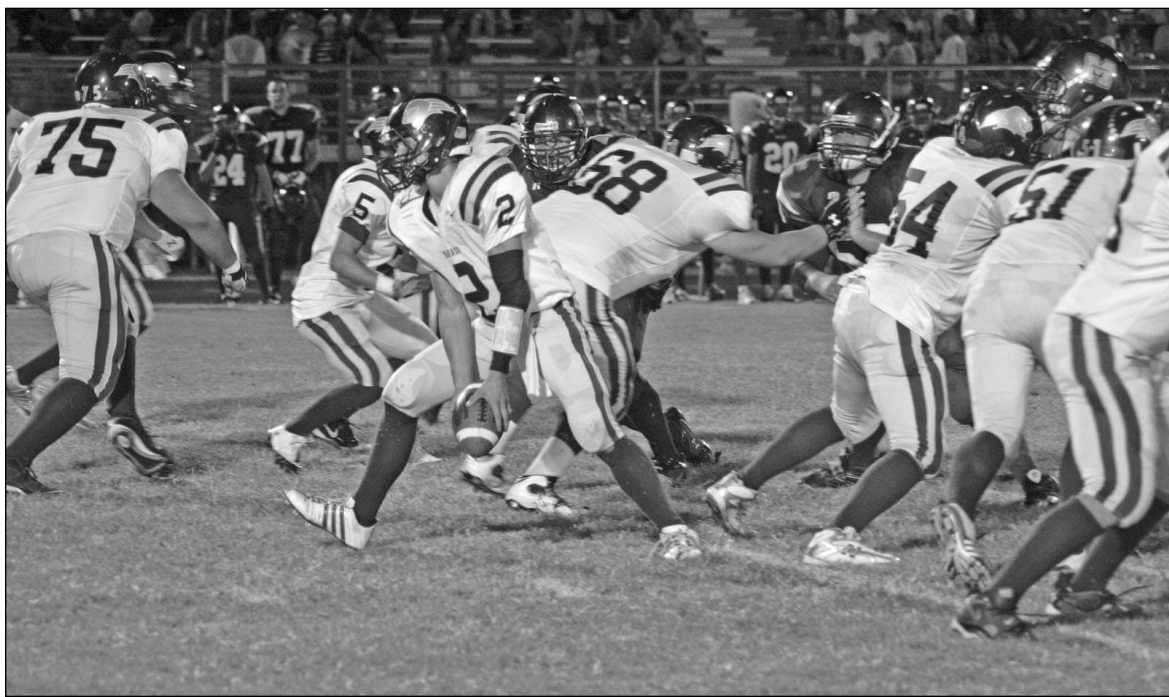
Greene ran it down to the Yuma 25-yard-line and two plays later hit Connor Dodds for TD. Homero Rueda's point-after kick was good and Havasu was within three, 34-31.

But on the next play, Baker ran the kick back 82 yards for the score that locked the game for the Criminals.

With about five minutes left, Havasu was moving the ball when Greene lost the handle and Yuma recovered. Baker then scored his final touchdown of the game and his 10th against the Knights this season.

Early on it looked like it could be anyone's game as the team traded touchdowns.

Havasu scored first on its third possession of the game, a 44-yard run on a fourth-and-three by Max Delia. Rueda's PAT was good.

This week was a different story, as Havasu's offense couldn't match Yuma and the Fighting Knights fell to the Criminals 48-31 in Yuma.

After forcing a punt, Havasu's Blake Garcia committed the first turnover of the night, a fumble at his own 35-yard-line. Yuma capitalized and Travon Clark ran it in from 14-yards-out. A two-point conversion gave the Criminals their first lead of the game.

It looked like another night of give-aways, as it appeared that Greene tossed the ball into Baker's hands in the end zone but a pass interference call went Havasu's way.

And with a second chance, Delia scored his second touchdown of the game, a run from 6-yards out.

Criminals' quarterback Donte Jackson got the lead back for

Yuma on the next series, running it in on a keeper from 10-yards out.

The Knights were forced to punt on the next series but Max Dreager picked off a Jackson pass for the first Yuma turnover. That led to a Rueda field goal and Havasu's final lead of the game, 16-14.

But with time winding down in the half, Jackson threw to Andrew Herrarte to take a 20-16 lead into the locker room.

The on the opening series of the third period, the Knights got two big penalties on one play, a facemask and an unsportsmanlike conduct, giving the Criminals an extra 30 yards and moved the

ball to the Havasu 22. With just over a minute off the clock, Baker ran it in from four-yards to score his school record 34th touchdown.

Clark followed that with another touchdown after the Knights were forced to punt the ball away.

The game closes out a string of five straight away games for the Fighting Knights. Havasu went 3-2 during the stretch.

The Knights return home on Friday for the first time since the season-opening loss to Yuma Sept. 28, taking on winless San Luis.
