FLAGSTAFF (AP) — After scoring on the first play of scrimmage in overtime, Montana came up with an interception on Northern Arizona's ensuing drive for a 41-34 win over the Lumberjacks in overtime Saturday.

On the first play of the extra session, Montana quarterback Andrew Selle found Tyler Palmer, who scampered in for a score.

## Ryan wins, Havasu teams second at Weston

Lake Havasu High School's annual cross country invitational Saturday started with a remembrance of a recently passed champion coach and ended with a two-team tribute to his family.

The first and second place teams — Brawley, Calif. and Lake Havasu — at the Mark Weston Invitational meet at the Bridgewater Links Golf Course Saturday gave their trophies to Pat and Jennifer Reynolds in memory of Ray Reynolds, the retired state champion cross country coach for Havasu who died this week.

"It was quite a day demonstrated by the athletes out there today. To run hard and then make that gesture was really something to see," said Havasu Athletic Director Roger Burger.

In racing, Brawley captured first in the boys division with 24 points, followed by Havasu at 58, Kingman 67, Las Vegas Bishop Gorman 138, Blythe, Calif. Palo Verde 139, Bullhead City Mohave 154, Laughlin 156 and River Valley with 181.

Parker and Yuma Catholic did not have enough runners for team scoring.

Anthony Smith finished top for the Havasu boys in a time of 18:34.23, followed by Kyle Staples in 18:49.23, Connor Kassik in 19:01.61, Brandon Neskahi at 19:21.72, Damon Sheehy in 21:14.28, Tristan Jandrew at 20:08.79 and Tyler Locatis in 20:45.82.

"I think this is one of their best meets of the season," said Havasu head coach Erika Washington. "It finally looks like everybody figured out how to pace themselves and run an effective 5k."

Parker was led by Jesus Saucedo with a time of 21:55.91, followed by Shane Edey in 26:48.67, Stanley Vescio in 29:19.53 and Justin Vescio in 33:01.07.

On the girls' side it was Brawley again taking the win with 31 points, followed closely by Havasu at 35, Kingman with 69, Laughlin with 108, Bishop Gorman with 121 and Palo Verde with 167. Mohave, River Valley, Parker and Yuma Catholic did not have enough runners for team scoring.

While Havasu didn't score first as a team the Lady Knights did have the meet winner, Lynsey Ryan, who finished in first in a time of 21:50.01, 13.08 seconds faster than the next runner.

"I felt ok I guess, it wasn't my best race," Ryan said, adding that the team's second place finish is because "we're young and still learning to run as a group."

Rita Bybee trailed Ryan, with Bybee finishing in seventh overall in a time of 23:05.18. After Bybee was Hanna Henson in 23:30.00, Jeanette Campos in 23:37.40, Mykaela Smith in 23:52.86, Gloria Moreno in 27:36.44 and Casey Wilson in 26:11.00.

"Everybody looked strong the whole time," said Washington. "And we had nice strong finishes."

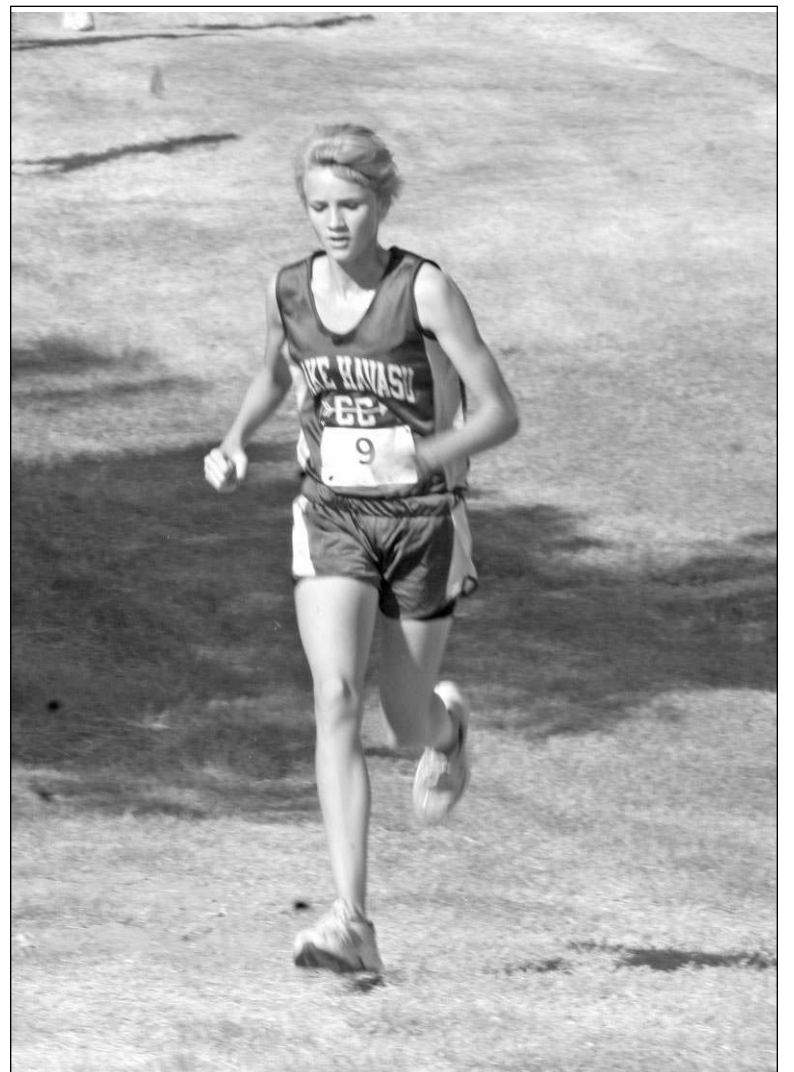
Janel Garner led the Lady Broncos with a time of 29:17.80, followed by Brie Miller in 29:28.15, Aleise Murphy in 30:28.85 and Janel Garner in 32:56.51.

In the middle school races, Alyssa Hankins was the top girls runner for Thunderbolt, finishing in second place, followed by fellow Thundercat Cierra Juarez in third and Daytona's Katie Baker in fourth.

For the middle school boys, Thunderbolt's Dylan Hudgel finished fifth and Daytona's Letrelle Williams was ninth.

In the LHHS Alumni Run, David Ryan took first followed by Dan Kuch and Malachy Ryan. And Rachel Cortez nosed out Taylor Melvin for the top female alumni finish.

## Foles leads Arizona past Oregon State

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Nick Foles passed for 254 yards and three touchdowns in his first start and the Arizona Wildcats shrugged off the loss of leading rusher Nic Grigsby to beat Oregon State 37-32 Saturday in the Pac-10 opener for both teams.

Making his first start as a college quarterback, Foles was patient and precise in directing the Wildcats' spread offense, which carved up Oregon State's inexperienced secondary.

James Rodgers had eight catches for 119 yards for the Beavers. Jacquizz Rodgers ran for 85 yards and two touchdowns and also caught 13 passes for 70 yards. Sean Canfield was 31-of-47 for 303 yards, two touchdowns and two interceptions. He was sacked five times.

The Beavers (2-2) fell behind 28-17 in the third quarter and had three chances for a winning drive. Starting at their own 3 with just over three minutes left in the game, the Beavers completed three passes, but Canfield was picked off by Devin Ross.

Arizona (3-1) went three-and-out, but punter Keeyan Crier pinned Oregon State to its 2, and the Beaver offensive line wilted. On the first play, Canfield was dumped in the end zone for a safety. The Beavers recovered the on-side kick, but Canfield was sacked twice more to end the game.

The Beavers are 109th in the country in passing defense.

Foles, the 6-foot-5 sophomore with a big arm, completed 25 of 34 passes and ran an efficient and effective offense even though Grigsby was lost to a shoulder injury after just one carry and backup tailback Keolo Antolin was slowed by a leg injury. In their absence, redshirt freshman Greg Nwoko had 76 receiving and 44 yards rushing.

Foles, who replaced Matt Scott as the starter this week, started out strong, coolly completing five of his first seven passes.

## Knights coach pleased with team's 'poise'

It was a big game for a number of reasons.

Not only was it a rivalry game against Mohave for the Golden Shovel, a win would give the Knights a winning record on the five straight away game stretch with one more road game to play. And a win would send the Knights into region play on a 3-game win streak.

The Fighting Knights delivered in a 28-21 win over Mohave in Bullhead City and head coach Karl Thompson said he was pleased with he saw.

"Coming out with a win does set the right tone going into conference. Hopefully that momentum continues," he said.

The Knights went to the air against Mohave, getting three of the team's four touchdowns on passes. And Paul Lake, in when Doug Greene went out at the start of the second half with a minor

ankle injury, tossed for two of them — to Dylan Culwell and Jeremy Holtzen.

"Lake does a really good job out there. He's a tough nosed guy, doesn't mind running between the tackles," Thompson said. "He can throw and he'll get the yards he needs to. He makes good decisions."

The Knights went to the air for 139 yards while rushing for 203 yards. Blake Garcia led the team with 164 yards and one TD, his seventh on the year.

On the defensive side, Thompson praised the play of Ryan Jordan, Max Dreager — who led the team with 10 tackles — and Ross Carlton, who he called "an unsung hero."

"Jordan, I think he had his best game of the season," Thompson said. "A lot of his tackles were getting down field and lateral movement."

The Knights close out the stretch of five straight away games with a rematch against Yuma

Friday. The Criminals handed the Knights a 50-45 loss in the season opener.

"We shored up some things (on defense). We play assignment football and I think we had breakdowns in that game," Thompson

said.

"Hopefully our offense keeps moving ball on ground and in air but I expect the same from Yuma."
